

# SACRAMENTO PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNOUNCES AUGUST 5 SOFT OPENING FOR NEWLY RENOVATED ORANGEVALE LIBRARY

After a year of renovations, Sacramento Public Library will reopen the newly expanded Orangevale Library to the public on August 5. A grand opening celebration for the community will take place on September 25.

"We are thrilled to welcome the public back to the Orangevale Library, which has nearly doubled in size," said Library Director and CEO Rivkah Sass. "This upgrade has been a long time in the making and we are grateful for the support from the County, Supervisor Frost, and especially our local community."

The \$950,000 renovation project makes the library fully ADA accessible, and doubles its footprint from 4,320 square feet to 7,910 square feet. The location includes new features to better meet the community's needs with spaces designed for teens and children, two new study rooms, more computers for public use and a new community room.

"A larger, more enhanced library has been on the Orangevale community's 'wish list' for decades," said Library Authority Board Member and County Supervisor Sue Frost. "The renovation designs were the result of a series of community meetings and focus groups in which residents consistently requested more space and more amenities to accommodate a multitude of uses and better meet community needs."

This is the second expansion of the library, which has been located at 8820 Greenback Lane since 2001. The Orangevale Library houses a collection of approximately 13,000 items while providing public-access computers, photocopiers, printers, early-learning stations, high-speed gigabit internet access, and other services commensurate with Sacramento Public Library service offerings.

This Orangevale Library is one of 28 locations in Sacramento Public Library's system and has been serving the Orangevale community since 1912.

Without a doubt, one of the things that make Orangevale special is its people who live and work here. It's no surprise why a very special Marine Veteran CW03 David Field, is choosing to make his home here in Orangevale thanks to the support of the 501(c)(3) non profit, Homes For Our Troops (HFOT). Fundraising help is still needed and is why Dairy Queen (DQ) and others are rallying during the month of August to help make David's dream come true.

"When I heard about David's story, we felt moved to help," said DQ owner, Cynthia Ellering, "So we decided to dedicate the month of August, to raise funds for a very special person and a very special cause."

Meet CW03 David Field. David enlisted in the military after high school in the late 1980s. He felt the Marines would be a good fit because it would give him direction and lead to more opportunities. He loved the camaraderie of serving and forming lifelong friendships so much he decided to make it a career.

Marine Chief Warrant Officer 3 David Field first experienced combat as a mechanic with the 8th



Transportation Battalion during Desert Storm in 1991. He returned to the Middle East in 2003 during the initial invasion of Iraq with Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 267, and again in 2009 to Afghanistan with Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 267.

After serving his country for 22 years, David retired in 2013. Two years later, started experiencing mobility issues. In 2017, he was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. The VA determined that David's disease is service connected.

David was an avid runner and cyclist who completed almost 20 marathons and several triathlons. As his symptoms progressed, when he could not run or ride, he enjoyed competing in almost every sport available in a wheelchair. He now enjoys listening to music, reading, and spending time with other Veterans.

Over the past two years, David has

become more reliant on his wheelchair, and he is currently in residence at a rehabilitation facility in San Diego. Receiving a specially adapted custom Homes For Our Troops home will provide David with the space necessary to have full time medical care,



making it possible for him to live on his own. The freedom and independence he will regain in his new home will empower David to venture outside the home more, something he cannot easily do in his current situation.

Hi Neighbors who want to Preserve Orangevale's Country Life,

The virtual Orangevale Community Planning Council workshop on July 6 concerning the Cardwell Avenue Area(rezone) Project was for information only and there was no vote.

Eight Orangevale residents called in making many good points against rezoning the 60 acres at the north end of Cardwell to build 35 to 37 homes instead of the 12 homes allowed in the last AR-5 area of Orangevale. The 60 acres are home to many wild animals, natural creeks and plant life that will be adversely affected by this project.

We were not informed as to how many emails the CPAC received against the proposal.

Three of our CPAC members made strong statements against this proposal.

I believe that developers are taking advantage of AR-5 prices to rezone and make big bucks. The applicant Dr. J D Singh, his engineer, and realtor said they will take into consideration the many points that were made against the proposal. Who knows what that means?! They may then file a formal application which would be heard first at an Orangevale CPAC meeting (always the 1st Tuesday of the month), and then go on to county meeting(s) for approval or denial. According to our Supervisor Sue Frost, the next CPAC meeting for this project will be open for public attendance.

We will be circulating a petition to keep the AR-5 zoning. Please check our Preserve Orangevale's Country Life face book page.

# Local Planning Follies: 2021 edition

A local resident recently wrote the Orangevale View to plead for citizen participation in landuse planning since Orangevale is "under threat." In this case, builders want more homes than the designated zoning, requesting 2 - 3 homes per acre rather than the current zoning of one on five acres. (The "Preserve Orangevale's Country Life" facebook page lists several projects that propose increased density in Orangevale north of Greenback.)

As someone who sat on a Community Planning Advisory Council (CPAC) for nearly a decade, I'd suggest Anderson is counting far too much on the CPAC, and is missing the bigger picture. Incidentally, there's a two-year term limit for CPAC members, but no one else was dumb enough to volunteer.

First, CPACs are advisory onlythey do not make the final decision. The Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors do that. When my CPAC voted unanimously to reject a project, the Supervisors unanimously approved it. Guess whose opinion prevailed?

In our region, the process itself is designed to fail. Public policy makers defuse public anger with endless, and meaningless hearings when the public patronizes meetings that are advisory only. Even zoning is virtually unenforced.

The region's planning process is so meaningless that in 2004, at the height of a recent housing bubble, 35,000 acres were proposed for rezone. We don't have "plans," we barely have suggestions.

A few years ago several locals told Supervisor Roberta MacGlashan we didn't want a Walmart at Hazel and Greenback, she rejected the request, saying the zoning was commercial, so she could do nothing about it. Zoning apparently arrives on stone tablets, engraved by lightning, at least until the land speculators propose a change.

A contrary example: by my count, the Tim Lewis' "Brentwood Village" development at Pecan and Greenback could have respected any one of four different plans: the Regional Blueprint, the Sacramento County General Plan, the Orangevale Community Plan and an "SPA" (Special Planning Area)--a 35-page document that was probably the result of weeks of advisory hearings and community deliberation. So which plan was built? Answer: None of the above. The stone tablets turn to vapor when the mood is right.

So when the Orangevale View writer says the proposed projects are not "following the rules" it's just a sign of inexperience with the system. Orangevale's proposals are tiny compared to 3,000 acres at Sunrise/Douglas which was rezoned from agriculture to intensive building. Sacramento City annexed then rezoned thousands of acres of agriculture in North Natomas. It's a pattern.

North Natomas is especially unsuited for development since it's 20 foot underwater floodplain surrounded by weak levees. It's so unsuitable that a federal grant to increase the regional sewer plant's capacity even required a \$6 million penalty if that capacity served North Natomas.

The speculators who controlled the North Natomas land were unfazed. They went all the way to then-vice-president George Herbert Walker Bush, who made that penalty payable in installments rather than the prohibitive up front fee, and got the speculators a \$43 million grant to improve those weak levees to pre-Katrina standards.

Paying \$6 on the installment plan, to get \$43 is a pretty good deal--but wait, there's more! The speculators paid roughly \$2,000 an acre for North Natomas, and once they got their entitlements Coffee Talk

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to build, sold it to builders for a hundred times what they paid (Wincrest homes was one buyer).

If your calculator isn't handy, that's 10,000% gross return on investment (ROI). And since developers can trade the newly-valuable land for income produc-

ing property like shopping malls and apartments and defer taxes indefinitely, it counts as after-

tax ROI!

The late Supervisor Grantland Johnson once told a public meeting that it's widely acknowledged throughout the state that our region is the most in the hip pocket of the developers. This is not a contest we want to win.

So while you're protesting a five acre rezone, ask Supervisor Sue Frost why she voted (on LAFCO) to expand Elk Grove by roughly a thousand acres when that City has at least that much vacant infill now. Ask our supervisors why we're even considering any outlying development when the region has 20 years worth of unbuilt infill. I'd encourage everyone to protest the process as much as any single project. We could have smart growth, but this ain't it. It's designed to fail, and works as designed.

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

# EXPLOSIVE TOPIC OF SACRAMENTO COUNTY

There are some issues that never seem to go away despite the best efforts of Sacramento County and the agencies we work with. This time of year, an issue that comes to the forefront of discussion is fireworks. It is a heated topic with valid concerns on both sides and every year, my colleagues and I hear all of them. One of the requests we most often get is to ban fireworks throughout the county. This would, of course, not only include the fireworks that are already illegal, but the permitted fireworks referred to as "safe and sane." That is not an action I am prepared to take and I wanted to use this article as a chance to discuss some of the reasons why.

First, I think we can all agree that illegal fireworks are a problem. When we are talking about illegal fireworks, we are talking about the large rockets exploding in the sky or the ones you cannot see but can certainly hear from across town. The complaints my office gets about fireworks are almost always referencing these types of fireworks, and that is understandable. These fireworks are dangerous and disruptive. Unfortunately, there is nothing the County can do to make these any more illegal than they already are. Nor is the County in a position to cut these fireworks off at the source. Illegal fireworks are brought in from outside the state, mostly from Nevada. The state does not provide the checkpoints and enforcement that are necessary to stop people from buying fireworks in Nevada and driving them home to set off in our communities.

Ultimately, that is what it comes down to - enforcement. The County cannot be the authority at the state border for obvious reasons. At the same time, whether it is the use of illegal fireworks or abuse of safe and sane fireworks around the 4th of July, the Sheriff's Department does not have the resources to find and cite every violator. The Sheriff also cannot shift resources to focus solely on fireworks when they have to prioritize more serious crimes which increase during this time of year. Our best option, and my highest priority, is working with state legislators to get solutions to what is truly a state-level issue. Meanwhile, I do not anticipate safe and sane fireworks leaving the County any time soon

Some of the loudest voices of concern I hear call for the banning of safe and sane fireworks in addition to those that are already illegal. But safe and sane fireworks are not the bulk of the problem. Additionally, every year, Sacramento County nonprofit organizations

raise thousands of dollars to support their causes from the sale of safe and sane fireworks. With illegal fireworks being the more prominent problem, banning safe and sane would do little more than deprive local nonprofits a significant fundraising opportunity. The same scenarios with illegal fireworks could play out with safe and sane if they were to be banned as well. Driving to a neighboring county to purchase illegal fireworks is a lot easier than driving to Nevada. My preference would be to maintain the fundraising opportunity for Sacramento County organizations. rather than drive local dollars outside the county just to have a minimal im-

The fact is there is no easy solution. Other counties with bans on all firework sales face similar problems to Sacramento County. We will not truly see relief from the major firework issues until the state can take control of the illegal fireworks flooding into the state. And while I understand the concern of those who think a full ban is the answer, I do not believe that to be the sentiment of most. For now, we are better served to focus our efforts on the illegal fireworks that pose the biggest threat to safety and sanity.

HEALTHY RANCH PRETZELS 6 cups pretzels

 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup butter or coconut oil, melted

1 TBSP parsley, dried 1 tsp dill, dried

 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp chives, dried

1 tsp pepper

1 tsp garlic powder

1 tsp onion powder Preheat oven to 325 degrees.

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or silicone mat.

# OV MONARCHS TAKES A RUN AT RELAY FOR LIFE

Keep your eyes open for 15 energetic girls canvasing Orangevale to invite you to make a difference in your community. The Orangevale Youth Soccer Club Monarchs, ages 10-11, are hoping to unite businesses and neighbors in support of cancer research and assistance by sponsoring their participation in Relay for Life, and in support of youth soccer players in Orangevale, as a portion of the funds will be used to provide tournament opportunities for the team. Fifty percent or more of funds raised will go directly to Relay for Life.

Members of the OV Monarch team will take turns running a 12-hour relay, 9am to 9pm, with the Sacramento Relay for Life held at The Mineshaft in Rancho Cordova on September 25th.

"I'm really excited," said Joanna Wilson, mother of one of the team's forwards. "Melina's already got sponsors after reaching out through my Facebook page. She's so excited to see the support."

The OV Monarchs embody much of what the Orangevale community is: connection and building together. Built on a core of friendship forged over the last 6 years they've championed each other through games and life since forming in 2016; even supporting each other while Covid kept youth soccer at bay last season. Coming into this the 2021 season, Coach Terry Miller saw an opportunity to create a more competitive experience for the team, while also showing the girls they can make a difference outside of soccer in their community.

"Terry has always been tremendously dedicated to these girls," said Assistant Coach Patsy McGavock. "He's always ahead in prepping new skills for them, asking what they felt they did well before giving more critical feedback, and raising the bar of their own expectations. His idea to partner with Relay for Life; it just shows me again how he is dedicated to their growth as individuals on and off the soccer field. I've already seen them grow in new confidences to open their mouths, step outside their comfort zones and do something challenging for the good of others. It's beautiful. It's building leaders who will accomplish great things.

Cancer hits close to home for some of the OV Monarchs. In preparing how to approach businesses, defender Becca Mc-Gavock reflected on why it's important to ask her community for help. She needed something to hang her confidence on. "I want to help people who are diagnosed with cancer," she wrote, "like my grandparents have been. I want to help people get the help they need."

Becca has lost two grandparents to complications from cancer, her mother's mother after breast cancer and her father's father after 10 years battling leukemia. Her remaining grandfather is currently under treatment for prostate cancer. Another teammates mother recently finished radiation treatments for breast cancer.

"I also love playing soccer," Becca continued. "And I love my team. We can help all the kids on my team play in tournaments this year. And if we fund all the kids on my team, we'll keep raising funds and be able to give even more to Relay for Life."

Miller has also found a way to pair tournament level competition and continued support of the volunteer run recreation level of play in Orangevale Youth Soccer Club. In most cases, players choose between recreational soccer, assigned teams and a weekend game, and competitive level soccer, selected teams through try-outs with weekend



tournaments. Recreational soccer gives all players a place to play, while competitive soccer allows stiffer competition. By remaining a rec team and selecting open tournaments for the Monarchs to participate in, Miller bridges the gap between rec and comp soccer. His continued support of the OYSC maintains the vital volunteer support needed to keep recreational youth soccer running in our community. Miller also serves on the OYSC board as the Recreational Coach Coordinator.

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
