

#### SPRING FOOD DRIVE EX-PANDS TO BRING EASTER JOY TO LOCAL FAMILIEs

The Orangevale Fair Oaks Spring Food Drive returns with a heartwarming twist - hosting both the Spring Community Food Drive and Helping Hands OV-Orangevale-Fair Oaks' Easter Baskets for Kids in Need on the same morning, Saturday April 12.

To prepare, residents are encouraged to run a simple neighborhood collection the week before, to maximize the food drives impact in our community, with neighborhood flyers easily downloadable from their website.

On Saturday, April 12, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m., residents are encouraged to drop off non-perishable food donations at the Orangevale Fair Oaks Food Bank. Easter basket donations, which have been pre-matched with families, will be collected from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. A community Easter celebration, including face painting, treats and photos with the Easter Bunny, will last through 12 noon.

Again this year, the food bank is encouraging residents to take food collection a step further by organizing mini neighborhood drives. Even small efforts add up—if just ten neighbors each fill a bag, neighborhood by neighborhood, the collective impact can quickly multiply. The food bank offers easy instructions and printable flyers on their website, invitations for neighbors to leave filled bags on their porches for pickup. Participants can then collect their neighbor's donations and deliver a trunkful of food to the food bank on April 12.

The impact of organized efforts is undeniable. According to Orangevale Fair Oaks Food Bank Director Andrea Scollay, more than 50% of donations at community drives come from neighborhood-led efforts. Last year, congregations that distributed collection bags to their neighbors delivered several truckloads of food a piece. A local scout troop can bring over 1,100 pounds of food, while two members of the Orangevale Woman's Club gathered over 700 pounds through a single neighborhood outreach.

"Every year, we're amazed by how generous our community is," said Sydnie Anderson, president of Helping Hands OV-Orangevale-Fair Oaks. "From donating Easter baskets to supporting the food drive, it's a heartwarming reminder that together, we can make a huge impact on the lives of local families."

Get involved as a volunteer at the big days event. Bring your friends and coordinate your neighbors to make a lasting impact on the food bank and lasting memories of serving your community together.

#### A Glimpse into History: The Victorian Gem of Central Ave, Orangevale

Nestled on 9281 Central Ave in Orangevale stands a beautiful Victorian home, a testament to timeless architecture and meticulous preservation. Built in 1906, this historic residence remains in pristine condition, offering a unique glimpse into the past. The current owners graciously allowed us to tour the home and its

surrounding property, even sharing a 1910 title report. This document revealed fascinating details about the home's history and its various owners over the years.

Originally sold as a 10-acre parcel, Tract 156, the property was purchased by C.R. Burroughs, a real estate investor from San Francisco. In 1897, Burroughs acquired three 10-acre tracts in total: 90, 154, and 156, for the price of \$10.00. The property changed hands



Casa Roble Freshman Breaks School Pole Vaulting Record <sub>By</sub> <sub>Katy Day</sub>

A Casa Roble High School athlete set a schoolwide record in pole vaulting at a recent track and field meet on March 1.

Freshman Siena Scott is currently participating in her first season as a track and field athlete on the Casa Roble team, but her interest in the sport sparked long before. "One weekend when I was younger, I was doing cartwheels and handstands during my brother's flag football game. A track and field coach menOakmont held the first meet of the season on March 1 for the Glenn Poole Invitational. Going into the meet, Scott was well-prepared and ambitious. "I jump twice a week, year-round with the club. and I attended the National Pole Vault Summit in Reno this winter. I also train with Casa's track team on sprinting to help me become faster on the runway. As my training and ability progressed, my personal goal was to break [the record] at the first meet," she said.

Scott returned home victorious, not only placing first in the varsity women's pole vault, but breaking the school record. freshman competing in the category.

Head coach Andre Ayala shared that he has had a very positive experience working with Scott. "Siena has been a fantastic addition to the team. Her eagerness to break records and achieve things no one else at Casa has done has been evident since day one. She has high expectations for herself which is exciting. Pun fully intended, the sky is the limit," Ayala said.

Looking ahead, the track and field team will be participating in the first GEL Center Meet on March 26, hosted by Casa Roble. Following this will be the Valhalla Distance Invitational at Oakmont High School on March 28. Scott says she hopes to qualify for the State Meet and ultimately become a D1 athlete with a scholarship. "It's been a really cool experience to be a part of a high school team, and to bring a special sport to the school," Scott said.

Add the dry ingredients to the other bowl and mix. Do not overmix. Pour into the prepared pan and bake for 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the bar comes out clean.

While the bars are baking make the glaze: 3 cups powdered sugar <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup cooled coffee Mix ingredients together and set aside.

Let bars cool for 10 minutes and then spread glaze over the warm bars. Cool completely and then cut into bars. Enjoy!

#### WHO YA' GONNA CALL? HOW 311 AND YOUR ELECTED REPRESEN-TATIVES CAN HELP

Have you ever seen a need or issue in your community and simply don't know where to start? Whether it's reporting potholes and fallen trees, getting help with state agencies, or navigating a permitting processes, 311 and the staff at your elected representatives' offices can change overwhelmed and uncertain to efficiently and effectively resolved.

With Orangevale and Fair Oaks among the 67% of Sacramento County that is unincorporated, county offices and special districts serve as the primary local government. Knowing who to call, and knowing you'll find an advocate there, empowers you to make a difference.

311: A Direct Line for Non-Emergency Issues

Sacramento County's 311 system is a direct tool for addressing almost any non-emergency, generally property related issue in unincorporated areas, from illegal dumping and potholes to verifying business licenses and garbage collection dates. Available 24/7 by phone, website, or app, it allows users to report concerns and track progress.

"311 is a great tool that lets residents and the county work together," said Vanessa Mc-Carthy-Olmstead, Chief of Staff for Supervisor Rich Desmond. "It creates a record of the issue, is geo-tagged, and allows residents to check for updates."

While 311 is best for non-urgent concerns, county staff step in when issues require more than just a service request.

How County Supervisor Staff Can Assist If an issue involves people rather than property, staff at your County Supervisor's office can help navigate complex situations and advocate for an issue that remains unresolved. Examples include issues of public

health, child support, Medi-Cal, adult protective services, and state-mandated county services including land use and permitting.

"Often we work hand-in-hand with multiple agencies," McCarthy-Olmstead explained. "Our staff can help make the right connections so people aren't spinning their wheels."

In example, McCarthy-Olmstead mentions speeding in neighborhoods. The supervisor's office knows the proper steps: connecting with the Department of Transportation for monitoring, determining whether traffic calming measures like speed tables are needed, and even coordinating with California Highway Patrol when necessary.

"If it deals with Human issues and someone don't know where to start, needs a follow up, or are bringing an issue that impacts their community to the attention of their elected official - these are excellent reasons to contact your supervisor's office," concludes McCarthy-Olmstead.

State-Level Assistance: Your Senator's Office

Anyone having trouble with a state related agency, such as DMV, Caltrans, Employment Development (EDD) and licensing agencies, should contact their State Senator's office, says Rob Olmstead, District Coordinator for Senator Roger Niello.

"We have staff who can take a concern, digest it, and figure out which agency to reach out to on behalf of the constituent," said. "We also have direct phone lines that the public doesn't have access to, which helps us advocate more efficiently.'

Visitors are also welcome to come in person to their senator's district offices, open Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Staff can even come to those who are physically unable to visit.

"Very few people know we are able to help with these kinds of services," Olmstead added. "No matter who you are-we just want to help. That's why we're here."

Leveraging the Staff's Connections

"When you call an elected representative's office, you're calling the agency's bosses, bosses, boss," said Matt Hedges, Chief of Staff for Supervisor Rosario Rodriguez. "Of course they respond. They want to do well for their boss."

The goal, Hedges said, is simple: "We want people to feel welcomed, not overwhelmed." For city-related concerns, residents should start with their city manager's office.

Your local government is accessible with elected officials' staff excited to help. When you see a need, feel empowered to make a difference with your local government connection.



## ADDRESSING HOMELESSNESS THROUGH UNIFIED ACTION



#### **Addressing Home**lessness Through **Unified Action**

When I took office, tackling the homelessness crisis was my top priority. As a member of the Folsom City Council, I witnessed firsthand how fragmented and uncoordinated the response was between the County of Sacramento and individual cities. Each jurisdiction worked

independently, duplicating efforts, lacking coordination, and ultimately failing to drive meaningful change. This disjointed approach has led to a system that simply

doesn't work. Homelessness is a regional crisis, and until we commit to working together as one unified force, we won't see a real decline in the numbers.

According to the most recent Pointin-Time count, Sacramento County has at least 6,615 homeless individuals-though I firmly believe this is an undercount. Even with this conservative estimate, the picture is stark: we have a fraction of the shelter beds, permanent supportive housing, and services needed to meet the demand. Without a collaborative strategy, we remain stuck in a cycle where homeless individuals are simply moved from one city to another as encampments are cleared, rather than being placed on a meaningful path to stability.

At the same time, we cannot allow illegal encampments and the status quo to continue. Sacramento County residents should not bear the brunt of inaction—whether it's in the form of blight, negative impacts on local businesses and neighborhoods, or increased crime. These encampments are unsafe, both for those living in them and for the surrounding communities. Clearing them isn't just about restoring order; it's about ensuring individuals have access to the treatment and services they need to get back on their feet.

The solution is clear: we must drastically increase the availability of shelter and supportive housing, while ensuring that our local government-county and city-works together in a unified system. This includes:

•Coordinating Resources Across Jurisdictions: Rather than cities and counties working in isolation, we need a shared strategy to efficiently allocate shelter beds, housing and services where they are most needed.

•Maximizing Existing Shelter Capacity: We must better manage our available shelter beds to ensure individuals have a safe place to go when encampments are cleared. •Expanding Services Alongside Shelters and Housing: Simply providing housing isn't enough.

True progress requires robust mental health care, substance use disorder treatment, and job training programs to help individuals transition back into society. Without these critical services, the cycle of homelessness will continue.

•Holding Ourselves Accountable: A fragmented approach has failed us. It's time for all local governments to take responsibility and focus on results over bureaucracy. As elected officials, we must ensure real-time data is used to improve efficiency and effectiveness, enabling quick action and problem-solving.

•Requiring Outcomes from Community Partners: Organizations receiving government funding must be held accountable, with key performance indicators based on measurable and achievable results reported monthly.

•Establishing Effective and Efficient Communication: Homelessness is the top priority for most of us living in Sacramento County, and addressing it requires clear, concise, and timely communication. We must utilize data to foster dialogue, understanding, and collaboration to drive better outcomes.

Sacramento County has a unique opportunity to set a new standard for addressing homelessness-not through fragmented efforts by individual cities and agencies, but by coming together as a unified force. I've been working to bring leaders together, including recent meetings with Sacramento City Mayor Kevin McCarty, to develop a collaborative strategy that will drive real, lasting change. We are joining forces to bring leaders from all cities in Sacramento County to identify the gaps and challenges within the current system, uncover deficiencies, and create a cost-effective, long-term plan to significantly reduce homelessness throughout our county.

If we fail to collaborate, the crisis will only deepen. But if we unite, we can build a system that helps move individuals off the streets and into stable, fulfilling lives.
